She has also worked as a Patent Examiner for the U.S. Patent and Trademark Office, where she focused primarily on patents related to business methodologies, cryptocurrencies, and network and financial transaction security.

In addition to her work as a patent attorney, Ms. Gaul currently serves as the Chair of the American Intellectual Property Law Association's Emerging Technologies Committee. She also founded a non-profit organization, STEM America, which is dedicated to providing STEM exposure and entrepreneur workshops to Americans from marginalized backgrounds. Ms. Gaul earned her J.D. from the Temple University Beasley School of Law and received a B.S. in Mathematics from Appalachian State University.
