The RAISE Act, signed into law by New York Governor Kathy Hochul on December 19, 2025, establishes safety,

documentation, audit, and incident-reporting requirements for large developers of frontier AI models, with a focus on preventing catastrophic harm. While the statute applies to a narrower group of developers than California's SB 53, it imposes more demanding obligations, including mandatory annual third-party audits and a 72-hour safety-incident reporting timeline.
